Dear Friends in Christ,

The week of our five year-old and two year-old grandsons fill home and lives with constant conversation and activity. Maybe little ones are the closest creation will ever come to perpetual motion. And it is a marvelous blessing having them visit for these seven days.

My letter to you this month addresses a decision we have to make.

Decision

In June I spoke to the church council about my desire to change worship time(s) in order to provide an hour between the two services. Doing so will provide me the opportunity to connect with both congregants and guests. Currently, I can only greet folks at the door before getting robed and ready for the second worship. Such a change would also benefit other persons involved with the later worship.

How we make this decision is as important as the decision itself! At the council meeting we discussed the benefits and detriments to making a change. We also set four times when Friedens members can also engage in this dialogue. The council will then make their decision at the August council meeting.

Healthy decision making happens when we follow certain practices that include:

1. We respect each other's point of view
2. We listen to each other and grasp what a person is saying before expressing our own opinion.
3. We endeavor to discern how we best further God's work in our midst, and value this over what is most convenient for us.
4. We own our own opinion in public dialogue. This means I do not speak about "they" or "I heard."
5. We work together to understand what is best today. What was before may have interest, but has no bearing on how God's work fits into today's setting.
6. We use public dialogue to listen to one another and offer our own opinion. This means we avoid private opinion sessions to rally people to a particular point of view.
7. We honor the process and honor the decision.

What is before us are two questions. The first question is whether we will create an hour between the two worship services. If we say "yes," then we deal with question two that asks, "How will we create an hour between the two worship services.

Here are the four times the council set for us to dialogue with each other: July 17 at 6 pm; July 20 at 10 am; July 26 at 7 pm; and, July 31 at 6 pm. At each session we will use a process of small group table talk and large group reporting. This method of decision making provides every person the opportunity to listen, ask questions, and express their thoughts.

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Of course we also pray over the process and the decision. In particular, we ask God for three things: one – the ability to discern God’s preference; two – the ability to set aside what “I want”; and, three – the Holy Spirit’s guidance to lead both dialogue and decision.

Yes, how we make decisions, how we live together as the Body of Christ, is far more vital to our mission and ministry than the decisions we make. It is a blessing to serve as your pastor.

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? Micah 6:8

Greetings in the name of Christ,

I write to you today with heavy heart over the horrific tragedy that unfolded in the early hours of Sunday, June 12, when a gunman entered a crowded nightclub in Orlando, Florida, and shot 103 beloved children of our Creator God, killing 49 of us. It has been called the most deadly mass shooting in U.S. history.

Though the shooter's precise motives are unclear, police are investigating evidence that he targeted the Pulse nightclub because, while attracting a diverse clientele, it was particularly popular with members of Orlando's LGBTQ community. President Obama called it, "an act of terror, and an act of hate."

The shooting stands in stark contrast to the bold vote of our recent Assembly to become a Reconciling in Christ Synod, signaling that all are welcome, especially our sisters and brothers in the LGBTQ community. And last month the Synod Council adopted a similar Statement of Welcome.

As we all struggle to make sense of this, I commend to you Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's letter in response, in which she reminds us "We must speak peace and reconciliation into the cacophony of hatred and division. We must live the truth that all people are created in God's image.

Please take the time to read Bishop Eaton's words. Take the time to pray and lament. And above all, please take the time to find ways in which you can take action:

to love your neighbor,

to reach across dividing lines and listen to and get to know those whom you perceive to be different from you,

to contact your elected representatives and advocate for legislation that will help to reduce gun violence and affirm the rights of all people,

to do your part to end the evils of homophobia, racism, xenophobia, intolerance, and violence, and work diligently to make our congregations welcoming and safe space for all God's children.

I leave you with words of Martin Luther from his reflection on the Fifth Commandment (*Large Catechism*):

In the second place, this commandment is violated not only when we do evil, but also when we have the opportunity to do good to our neighbors and to prevent, protect, and save them from suffering bodily harm or injury but fail to do so. If you send a naked person away when you could clothe him, you have let him freeze to death. If you see anyone who is suffering from hunger and do not feed her, you have let her starve. Likewise, if you see anyone who is condemned to death or in similar peril and do not save her although you have means and ways to do so, you have killed her. It will be of no help for you to use the excuse that you did not assist their deaths by word or deed, for you have withheld your love from them and robbed them of the kindness by means of which their lives might have been saved.

CHICAGO (ELCA) – The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has issued a letter in response to the June 12 shooting that claimed the lives of 49 people at a nightclub in Orlando, Fla. This is the deadliest mass shooting in U. S. history. In the letter Eaton states, "We must speak peace and reconciliation into the cacophony of hatred and division. We must live the truth that all people are created in God's image."

Eaton's letter follows:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them." Genesis 1:27

We are killing ourselves. We believe that all people are created in God's image. All of humanity bears a family resemblance. Those murdered in Orlando were not abstract "others," they are us. But somehow, in the mind of a deeply disturbed gunman, the LGBTQ community was severed from our common humanity. This separation led to the death of 49 and the wounding of 54 of us.

We live in an increasingly divided and polarized society. Too often we sort ourselves into like-minded groups and sort others out. It is a short distance from division to demonization. Yesterday, we witnessed the tragic consequences of this.

There is another way. In Christ God has reconciled the world to God's self. Jesus lived among us sharing our humanity. Jesus died for us to restore our humanity. God invites us into this reconciling work. This must be our witness as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The perpetrator of this hate crime did not come out of nowhere. He was shaped by our culture of division, which itself has been misshapen by the manipulation of our fears. That is not who we are. St. Paul wrote, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation; everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new. All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ" (II Corinthians 5:17-20).

Our work begins now. We need to examine ourselves, individually and as a church, to acknowledge the ways we have divided and have been divided. We must stand with people who have been "othered". We must speak peace and reconciliation into the cacophony of hatred and division. We must live the truth that all people are created in God's image.

This morning your churchwide staff came together to mourn and to pray. We prayed for those killed in Orlando and remembered the Charleston Nine killed only a year ago. We prayed for the family of the shooter, for our LGBTQ brothers and sisters and for our Muslim brothers and sisters who now face the threat of retaliation. And we prayed that the Prince of Peace will bring us to the day when we stop killing ourselves.

Chris Heft, President, called the meeting to order at 7:15 pm.

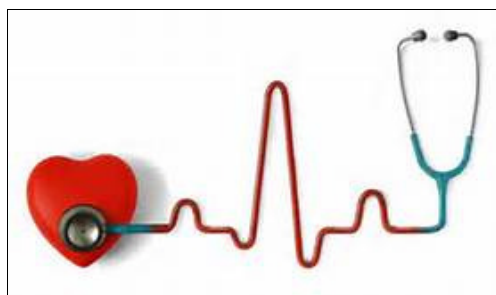
